What Now?

- Given scale of threat there needs to be substantive response
- Iwi katoa must respond
- Need to comprehensively reject Government proposals, but
- Must advance our constructive proposals to address problems

What now?

what can we each do to protect and enhance our rights?

Respond to the Government's proposals –
submissions on this phase close on Feb 28

- Inform your board members, AHC members hapu and wider Iwi members about the proposals, their likely impact and your views on them

What now?

what can we each do to protect and enhance our rights?

Ensure that the proposals don't further drive a wedge between the different dimensions of maori rights to fishing

- Hold discussions with local customary non-commercial representatives to agree the need to align both commercial and non-commercial interests in fishing so that mutually supportive policies can be implemented – use commercial to assist effective arrangements
- Alert local customary non-commercial representatives to what is being proposed in the Government's "shared fisheries proposals"
- Encourage them to make their views known either separately or in conjunction with your iwi
- Suggest that to protect the full dimensions of maori rights to fish they should work with you over the longer term to develop a fisheries strategy for your Iwi and hapu that can then be offered as a guide to working with other Iwi within QMAs
