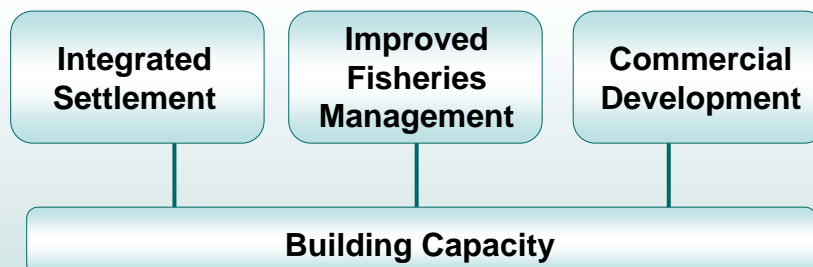
Kaimoana Strategy
